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## WALL OF FAME CEREMONY BRINGS THE BEST OF THE PAST ALIVE

On Friday, May 17, in the main hallway at SBHS, five special graduates of the school were honored by friends, family, alumni, and students in the first induction ceremony for our Wall of Fame. MARTHA GRAHAM '13, CAESAR UYESAKA '36, LEON LITWACK '47, EDDIE MATHEWS '47, and RON SHELTON '63 may seem a disparate group, united solely by their attendance at SBHS. However, the various speakers cited significant connections among these five.



For example, Ron Shelton pointed out that the *Los Angeles Times* had once printed a trivia question about him and Martha Graham. What do Martha Graham and Ron Shelton have in common? They were both captains of their basketball teams at SBHS. That particular connection is tenuous, but both Graham and Shelton gained admission to the Wall because of their

respective careers in the world of the arts.

The ceremony had its serious moments, especially during the poignant reflections of PAUL UYESAKA '65, who spoke movingly about his father, Caesar. Paul began his comments by saying he had just come from the SBHS Veterans Memorial by the gym, where he noted the name of his brother ROBERT '63, commemorating his death in Vietnam, one of the saddest events of Caesar's life. Paul also spoke of the Uyesaka family pride, of his father's insistence on doing one's best, of persevering in the face of adversity. Paul celebrated his father's commitment to this community, particularly to the young people of Santa Barbara. He pointed out that Caesar had coached youth baseball, where a frequent opposing coach was RATH SHELTON, Ron's father. He also reflected on his friendship with Ron.

Speaking of his cousin EDDIE MATHEWS, GENE BOWMAN '50 focused on Eddie's generosity and his legendary loyalty to his teammates. He emphasized the friendship between Eddie and HANK AARON, his teammate for many years, and of Eddie's insisting on having Aaron accompany him on frequent evenings out in major league cities where blacks and whites were uncommon company. Gene talked frankly about the rough side of Mathews and indicated that one of Eddie's last wishes was to have time to make it up with many people. Speaking of himself, Gene mentioned that it was appropriate for the ceremony to take place near the principal's office, where he had spent some nervous times.

LEON LITWACK '47 picked up on the theme of office time by reminding us that as editor of *The Forge*, he had frequent meetings with the vice-principal, who was often critical of his editorials. One in particular brought chuckles from the audience, a 1947 plea that the city of Santa Barbara cancel Fiesta and commit the supporting funds to begin building low-cost housing for the many Mexican-Americans here who were living in old, ill-built accommodations. Leon praised Harvey Holt for offering advice and pardons, which kept him an active editor. He also praised teachers like E. Louise Noyes, Helen Tessien, and Helen Thompson, who recognized his love of reading and who passed on to him books for his personal intellectual journey.

RON SHELTON '63 testified to regarding Mathews as his personal idol, still treasuring an early Mathews baseball card and the Eddie Mathews model Louisville Slugger which

he won for leading the Dons in batting during his senior season. He recalled taking time out of a busy day of work to compose an obituary for the *Times* in honor of Mathews, a loving testimony to the power of the athlete as icon. He told of the joy of growing up in Santa Barbara, of playing in youth baseball leagues which UYESAKA had helped to found, of the teachers who had helped him, and of the friends like Paul Uyesaka, who had enriched his life here.

In conclusion, Principal JOHN RICHARDS '57 remarked on the close ties between his family and the Sheltons, spoke of his admiration for the exploits of Mathews and Bowman on the athletic fields here at SBHS, paid his thanks to CAESAR UYESAKA's generosity to the community, and pointed out the rich variety of excellence we were celebrating in this inaugural group of honorees. He also pledged to read Litwack's *Been in the Storm So Long*.

We expect this event will be just the first of annual ceremonies honoring the elite of our school's alumni. It has been a long time coming, and several people deserve special recognition. First and foremost, SHARON HENNING '74, who conducted the various meetings and kept the staff, students, and alumni focused on the road to success. She also did the matting and the layout for the photographs and the supporting text.

Throughout the process, JOHN RICHARDS '57 was totally supportive. FRANK SWAIN '47 again proved determined and resourceful in contacting our honorees or their families and in acquiring important photographs. OLIVIA CAMPA '02 and JULIE TSE '02 were diligent and inventive in obtaining yearbook photos and in creating printed documents for the honorees. PAUL BETZ, the woodshop teacher, made the special large frame, and JOHN CAMPILIO '53 assisted with nominee information.

The framed display of the five honorees, with graduation and adult photos and a short biographical sketch, is located near the faculty mail room, just to the right of the entrance to the principal's office. We will work on the next five members of the wall of fame this year. Should any of you have nominations for this honor, please write to us with a name, year of graduation, and a short description of your nominee's accomplishments.

We ask that the nominees be out of school for at least 10 years.

The 23 scholarship winners who were presented at the annual awards dinner will be traveling varied paths in the future, but as a group they demonstrated two dynamic common qualities: a record of academic and community achievements and a deep drive to continue their educational adventure. All of us in the association can be proud of their accomplishments and can anticipate equally grand successes in their futures. The students and the Board of Directors extend thanks to all of you who have made these awards possible. Each of these students has also been given lifetime memberships to the Alumni Association. The students are presented in alphabetical order with their respective scholarships.



**THE CLASS OF 1956 SCHOLARSHIP.** As a member of the Don football and soccer teams, CARLOS ADAME showed the values of teamwork and commitment. He was named the scholar-athlete for football and was captain of the soccer team. He has received a governor's Scholar Award and coaches soccer at the SB Boys and Girls Club. He will be the first in his family to attend college when he enrolls at SBCC in August as a business and economics major.



**THE MIRIAM J. AYLESWORTH MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP.** The winner of this scholarship has already made notable contributions to the school and to the alumni association. 

### FRED WARRECKER NAMED COACH OF THE YEAR BY THE SANTA BARBARA ATHLETIC ROUNDTABLE



FRED WARRECKER'S long and distinguished career as baseball coach at SBHS earned him special recognition last May at the annual awards dinner of the Santa Barbara Athletic Roundtable. Warrecker, who has also coached football and taught English many years, won the honor primarily for his outstanding accomplishments on the baseball field. His teams have been recognized for solid fundamentals and for a dedication to playing the game with spirit and commitment. Honored along with Warrecker were two Don players, RYAN SPILLBORGHS '98, college player of the year, and current Don, JONATHON COOMBS '02, high school player of the year.

Warrecker retired from his teaching duties in February but will continue as the Dons' baseball coach and as an assistant with the football program. He is a student of history and literature and uses his readings to complement the business of imparting baseball fundamentals as he slips in observations about humane values as part of his coaching. The net effect of his coaching is to emphasize the fact that there is a rich world beyond the boundaries of the baseball field.



Warrecker, who will continue his coaching duties for at least a few more years, is in the midst of his most successful run as a coach, his teams having won the last four Channel League titles. This year's squad continued their successful season well into the CIF playoffs. The young and not so young men who have played Don baseball for Warrecker often see their baseball careers end with their final game at Eddie Mathews Field. A few have gone on to success at the higher levels of college, university, and professional baseball, but all of them carry a special gift wherever they go, the recognition of having had a special coach and teacher, a mentor.

### CLASSROOM ASSISTANCE PROGRAM CONTINUES ITS SUPPORT OF INSTRUCTIONAL PROGRAMS

The Classroom Assistance Program funded four recent teacher requests for materials which will prove useful to varied classroom work on the campus. One request, from English teacher RODGER DAWSON, was put to immediate use by the students in the Visual Arts and Design Academy, who were preparing their spring show of artwork for the community. The students employed a newly purchased, sophisticated color printer to reproduce the many images they had created over the semester. The printer satisfies the need for high definition reproductions and has the capacity to handle variable formats. According to Dawson, the show would have been nearly impossible without the special printer.

Another request from jewelry teacher JENNIFER RABE was for the purchase of several work tables for students producing high quality jewelry. We had purchased a few of these tables two years ago, and Rabe was completing the classroom's complement of work stations. This is one of SBHS's most successful art programs, and the excellence of the student work is evident in the two sales of student work near the end of each semester. For those of you looking for special Christmas gifts, take a look at the student work which is offered for sale the week before Christmas vacation. The students rebate a share of their sales money to the jewelry program.

Our third gift will supplement several of the department programs; we provided \$500 to the librarian, MARSHA BARR for the purchase of additional reading material for the library. She will be selecting fiction and nonfiction materials, some in Spanish, from the State of California recommended reading list. Barr is one of the special people at SBHS, a diligent lady dedicated to expanding student opportunity through the operation of a center that provides multi-media materials and computer resources to the students.

In September we funded our first project for the year when we underwrote the purchase of supplementary reading materials for KIM NEWTON, a French and English teacher, who uses these student directed magazines to motivate her pupils as they inform themselves about subjects beyond their particular textbook concerns. The magazines come on a monthly schedule, and the students eagerly anticipate their arrival.

An editorial comment: we all have special memories of the fine teachers at SBHS. I can attest to the fact that that same energy, enthusiasm, and commitment still exists in abundance at the

school. You can all be proud of the effort the faculty puts into the work of the school and their dedication to the students. My experience with this project, along with other dealings with the teaching staff through the Classroom Assistance Program, confirms my belief that our teachers are simply the best. OLSEN of Lompoc wrote about the effect an unexpected compliment from a teacher can have upon a student. "By far the best compliment I ever received was from my ninth grade music teacher. He reached out one day and took hold of my ear, wiggled it gently and said, 'Don't ever lose that ear—it's worth a million bucks.' My teacher's name was Henry Brubeck (older brother of jazz great Dave Brubeck)." GERD (COTTOM) JORDANO '57 is the current chair of the Westmont Foundation, which is made up of community leaders working to improve ties between Westmont and the community. Jordano has been involved with numerous community organizations such as Santa Barbara Scholarship Foundation, Hospice, and the Santa Barbara Zoological Society.

### IN MEMORIAM

SBHS lost two of its most dedicated alumni over the summer. Both were lifelong, ardent Dons.

ERNESTINE SHEAN '29, our second Alumni Association President and former registrar at the school, died in July. Her dedication to the school and to the greater community won her The Distinguished Alumni Award in 1988. "Ernie" holds the record for continuous tenure at SBHS: 45 years; three as a student and 42 as a loyal employee. Immediately after her graduation, she began work in the attendance office and served as secretary to vice-principal Leonard Bowman and later as secretary to Harvey Holt. Her longest-held position was her final job as registrar from 1956 to her retirement in 1976. Her concern for students led her to serve on the board of directors of the Santa Barbara Scholarship Foundation and to serve as state chair of the California State Employees Association Scholarship Committee. Preceded in death by her husband Cliff '34, she is survived by her son Bob '66.

Our second notable loss occurred with the death of Mr. Don, MARV GOUX '51. A member of Coach Schutte's last three football teams, Goux was a highly spirited, lion-hearted competitor. To hear him talk about Don, later USC, football was to witness an intensity of dedication that was absolute and unique. He was loved and honored by his teammates and by many of USC's finest athletes. He knew only one speed-full-and one objective-excellence. Goux is a member of the USC, Rose Bowl, and Santa Barbara Athletic Round Table Halls of Fame. Longtime friends and classmates SAL PADILLA and JACK DAYTON spoke of their love and admiration for Goux, who is survived by his wife, daughter, four grandchildren and by his brother JIM GOUX '53. Athletic Director LITO GARCIA has plans for honoring Goux during this year's football season at Peabody Stadium.

## THE CHANGING SCENE AT SBHS



Employing a variety of school bond money, generous donations from friends, and volunteer labor, several noteworthy projects are changing the face of SBHS. The first project to be completed is the new ticket booth at the head of the paved graduation walkway

into Peabody Stadium. A handsome, tile-roofed building now stands ready to speed access to the stadium on the visitors' side. For years school personnel sold tickets out of windows in the school to patrons who then had to hike back to the stadium entrance. This booth will make attendance much easier by disbursing tickets right at the entrance to the stadium.

The second project, still underway as school commenced, is the rearranging and re-landscaping of the flagpole entrance to the main building. Gone is the semicircular drive, which went right up to the front steps. New walkways and lawn will give the school front less of a street side air. The work was conceived partly as an answer to



student safety and as an attempt to increase the beauty of the school's main entryway. The new project will provide handicapped parking areas and will afford easier handicapped access around the front of the school. The landscaping will take a while to mature, but the net effect should be much more pleasing.

The third project, and the most comprehensive of all, is the complete renovation of the swimming pool. The school district had allocated nearly \$800,000 for pool work, but a group of parents and friends of the swimming program convinced the district to allow more extensive repairs and redesign work. Those citizens were able to raise nearly \$300,000 to underwrite the building of a much larger pool deck, and to provide pool space for



instructional and safety programs. The project will take several months to complete, thereby displacing the swimming and water polo training for the Dons until the pool's reopening sometime this spring. The completed facility will be a fantastic venue for Don swimmers and an enduring testament to the energy and commitment of the boosters who have made the facility expansion their monument to their special efforts.

The new pool will be enlarged and so arranged that a water polo area, complete with two deep ends, can be set off from other pool areas. The aquatics committee is working with the city to build a cooperative program with the city so that seniors can have lap swimming and the many youngsters in the neighborhood who gather at the Boys and Girls Club can receive water safety instruction.



For those of you wishing to contribute to the new aquatics center, the booster club has a program to acknowledge various levels of giving through a mural program. Donor gifts will be indicated on the mural according to the following schedule: Elite level, over \$5,000; Level I, \$1,000 to \$4,999; Level II, \$500 to \$999. Make checks payable to SBHS Aquatics Booster Club (Tax deductible), and send them to the club at 310 Malaga Drive; Santa Barbara, CA 93108. At its September meeting, the board of directors voted to contribute \$500 to the project.


