



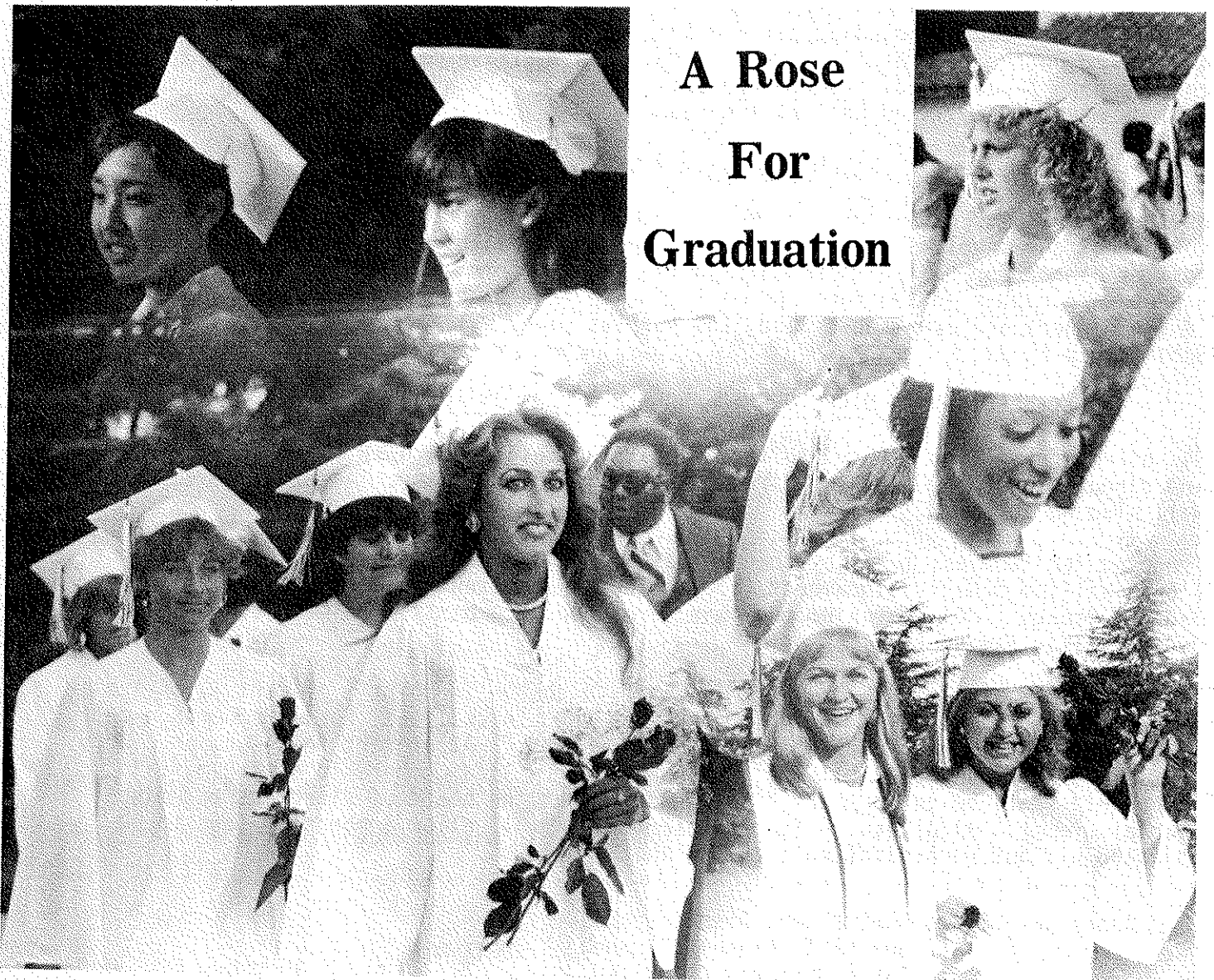

ELECTION OF DIRECTORS, CHANGE IN BYLAWS ON AGENDA MAY 25

Six directors will be elected to the Alumni Association board at the annual meeting and dinner dance May 25 at the Miramar Convention Center. A change in the bylaws will also be voted on.

Proposed for two-year terms by the Nominating Committee are Wendy Bradley Kwaitowski ('64), William McNally, incumbent ('70), Albert Rasmussen, incumbent ('39), and Gail Badillo Yznaga ('80). Seeking one-year terms are incumbents John Campilio ('53) and Judy Pritikin Savage ('73).

The board will also ask the members to ratify a change in point 1 of Part IV of the bylaws to read as follows: "Article 4 -- FEES AND LIABILITY 1. Fees--Membership fees shall be set by the officers and board of directors." At present this section reads: "Article 4--DUES AND LIABILITY 1. DUES--Dues for a life membership or a memorial membership shall be ten dollars (\$10), except that the board of directors may make special promotional offers." The proposed change will allow membership fees to be adjusted without necessitating a change in the bylaws.

SCHOLARSHIP FUND SET UP IN MEMORY OF BARASA THOMAS

At the request of friends of Barasa Thomas ('81), the Alumni Association has established a scholarship fund in memory of the former Don athlete, who died late last year.

Thomas came to Santa Barbara from Kenya, Africa, in 1978. At SBHS he was known not only for his exploits as a runner (CIF 4-A cross country champion in 1979, second in 1980; CIF mile runner-up and fifth in the state in 1981) but also for the warmth of his personality. "He was a fantastic person," said SBHS Coach Don Heinrichs. At Fresno State he won two PCAA championships in the 3000 meter steeplechase before suffering a severe knee injury last spring.

WE'RE GROWING IN SIZE, EXCELLENCE, POPULARITY

With schools on the firing line, particularly California's high schools, the staff has spent a great deal of time this year working on curriculum and test results. Students at SBHS today are taking many more required courses than they took when the "elective" program went into effect in 1970. Results for all three Santa Barbara high schools continue to show them to be above state and national averages, but our staff is determined to raise the standing of Santa Barbara High School even higher.

Five seniors were National Merit finalists this year, which ranks them in the upper 1/2 of 1% of the students graduating throughout the United States. Once again we anticipate over \$300,000 worth of scholarships to be awarded to the Class of 1985. The Santa Barbara High School Alumni Association scholarships remain popular among those applied for by students who are graduating.

It is interesting to note that the graduation ceremonies have returned to their more traditional style. The staff appealed to the seniors to restore the dignity of the ceremonies, which had been lost in recent years, and they responded positively. If you have been in attendance the past three years, you have found that the traditional "walk down the hill" continues as in previous years. The dignity of the Santa Barbara High School ceremony certainly places it among the most beautiful high school graduations in California.

The popularity of our campus with Santa Barbara area students is notable, as the enrollment will be back up to 2400 students next fall. Many students from San Marco's High School and from private schools in the area continue to enroll at SBHS. This phenomenon of growth at Santa Barbara High, while other schools in the area are faced with declining enrollment, is a tribute to the staff at SBHS for providing an outstanding educational program.

We welcome any alumni to visit the campus whenever they can. The tradition remains while the program keeps up to date.

THREE CHEERS FOR SANTA BARBARA JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL!

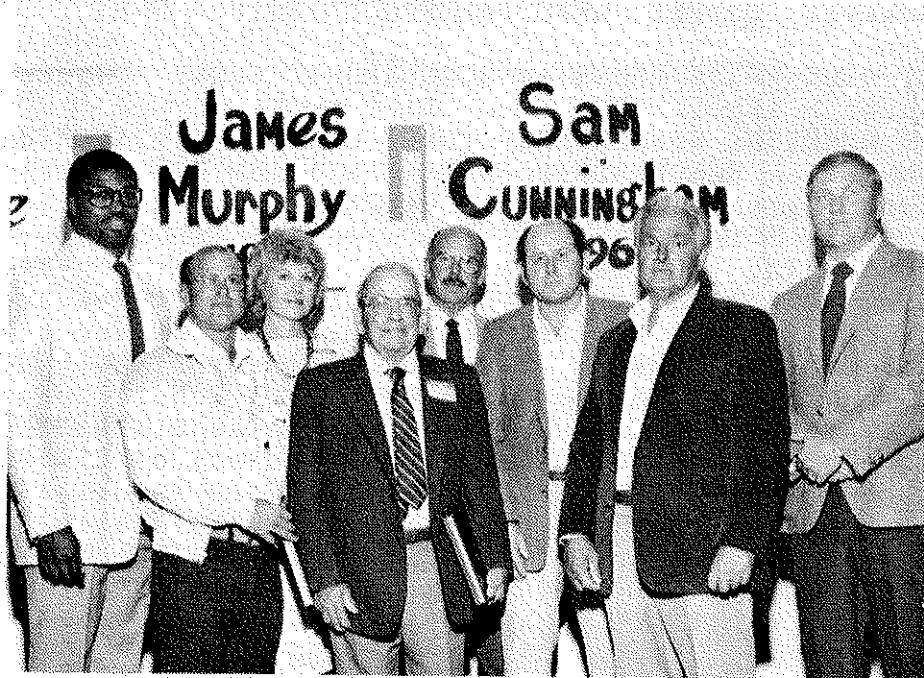
To have the school considered for the commendation, school officials filled out a 17-page questionnaire concerning curriculum, student achievement, special offerings, etc. Among the positive aspects of the SBJHS program cited as a basis for the award were its program for the gifted, the large number of its students enrolled in early-morning advanced foreign language and mathematics courses at Santa Barbara High School, the school's reading center, and the computer education program.
