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## 125TH ANNIVERSARY GATHERING A GREAT EVENING FOR MEMORIES



“Recycled Teenagers” at our anniversary celebration

Friends of SBHS—alumni, current faculty, retired faculty—all enjoyed a wonderful evening celebrating the 125 years of our alma mater. Representatives of the classes from the late eighties back to 1917! stood as President Maureen (MacQuiddy) Masson '53 called the roll of classes.

The audience heard from Marion (Huaun) Anderson '25, vice-president of the student body during the first year of classes at the Anapamu site. She spoke poignantly of that first year and of her classmates, who have observed reunions each year since 1930, excepting the war year of 1945. She introduced her friend VIOLA GIRSH '24, and described the dedication ceremony of Peabody Stadium on Thanksgiving Day in 1925. Also present from the Class of 1925 was MARCIA (GOODWIN) VAILE, to give us a trio from the new campus' first year.

Following Anderson to the podium was CHRISTINA (TONIETTO) CAVALLERO '38, the first president of our alumni association. She described the work and planning that went into the Centennial observation in 1975, and explained how the Centennial Committee laid the foundation for this association. She also remarked on our extensive program of achievements: support to the students and staff, the growth of our scholarship program to a total of over \$250,000, and our current pace of 20 \$1,000 scholarships each year. All of you have made this 25 years of work possible.

Our final alumni speaker, JOHN WHITTEMORE '17, received a rousing welcome, and quietly commented that his longevity was due to a lifetime devoted to athletic competition and right thinking. (A full interview with Mr. Whittemore is covered elsewhere.)

JOHN RICHARDS '57, the current principal, then introduced BILL JACKSON, principal from 1972-1988, who spoke of the many challenges faced by the school in the early 70's and of the continual dedication of the staff to making SBHS a high quality institution, ready to provide the best education possible for its students.

Finally John Richards introduced the current staff members who were in attendance and congratulated them for continuing the long tradition of excellence at the school. He also paid tribute to his father, JACK RICHARDS, a longtime Santa Barbara educator and for many years the principal at La Colina Junior High School.

Representing the current student body, ELI GOLDSMITH '00, ASB President, and STEPHANIE OWEN '00, Senior Class President, spoke of their respective feelings for the school and its traditions. Both were highly appreciative of the Alumni Association and of all the friends of SBHS in the audience.

Door prizes were awarded to NELSON LETENDRE '62, who had come from Wellsley, Ma. for the occasion; to former teacher Don Ray Pierce for making the first reservation; to Bob Young '53 for holding the winning ticket for the gift basket from Jordano's. We had two other donated prizes, one from SUSAN ROSAS, the wife of GIL ROSAS '54, who gave us a set of costumed nutcracker figures. The grand prize was an overnight with breakfast at SBHS's old neighbor on De La Vina St., The Upham Hotel.



# ALICE (CHARD) TARBUSH '44, ERNIE BROOKS '53 NAMED DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI FOR 2000.



ALICE (CHARD) TARBUSH '44 followed a traditional educational course here in Santa Barbara: Harding Grammar, La Cumbre Jr. High, SBHS, and Santa Barbara State College (now UCSB). Unlike most of her classmates, TarBush dedicated her life to schools and education as a teacher and administrator, retiring from the elementary district in 1994, only to return as an assistant administrator at Adams School, marking 42 years of service in education.

Many of our alumni have benefitted from her dedicated instruction at Harding School. Besides her classroom work, TarBush has maintained active memberships in the PTA and in various professional teaching organizations. Also a longtime member of Alpha Delta Kappa and Delta Kappa Gamma, she has served on many committees and worked on numerous educational projects.

She is well versed on the major educational changes which have been recently proposed and maintains her active interest in such important programs as those for Mentally Gifted Minors and Gifted and Talented Education Classes in the local school district.

In her current position, TarBush considers herself as “. . . a mentor and consultant assisting administrators at district and site levels in the development of curriculum, implementation and evaluation of programs.” She is a ready source of assistance for current teachers.

Other organizations such as the American Legion Auxiliary Honor Group and the Santa Barbara Retired Teachers Association claim her time and energy. Among the most pleasant of her tasks is assisting the Class of 1944 with their reunion plans.

The Class of 1944 can proudly claim Alice TarBush as their own. However, she belongs to a much wider community—all of Santa Barbara—as a dedicated and beloved teacher. We are honored to name her a Distinguished Alumni Award Winner for Santa Barbara High School.

ERNIE BROOKS '53 is a lifetime resident of Santa Barbara, attending local schools through SBHS, then serving a tour in the Air Force. The 1953 *Olive and Gold* stated that he planned on the U.S. Navy, Scripps Institution of Oceanography, and automotive design. But the navy recruiter was out of his office and the air force recruiter was in. Hence, five years of service as an aerial photographer visiting 42 countries and seeing the navy from above.

He missed out on Scripps but met Jacques Cousteau in 1958 while filming Ethiopia and The Sudan for the USAF. Brooks moved more completely into the Cousteau world via his lifelong interest in scuba diving, photography, art, and science as director of Brooks Institute of Photography from 1961 to 2000.

He was named to the Diving Hall of Fame(1973), honored as the Underwater Arts and Science Diver of the Year(1995), won the Ocean Planet Smithsonian, Sea Space Award, and was honored with a Kennedy Award of Excellence.

He emphasizes his debts to three special teachers: MAUDE ROBINSON at La Cumbre and DOROTHY (WESTFALL) BRUBECK and MARGARET STRAIGHT of SBHS.

Brooks is still thinking about automotive design(His secretary indicated he has taken up welding). His longest organizational affiliation is with the Igniters, the SBHS car club he joined in 1952. His pride in that group is certainly justified. Over the past several years the club has raised approximately \$80,000, heading towards a \$100,000 endowment to be awarded to SBHS graduates.

We are proud to acknowledge a lifetime of professional accomplishment and community service by presenting Ernie Brooks '53 with a SBHS Alumni Association Distinguished Alumni Award.

## CAP'S GIFTS TO THE SCHOOL

Early last fall, we provided 30 copies of our Centennial Book, *The First 100 Years of SBHS* for use in the Student Government class, a course taught by BILL OLIPHANT and required for all the students in student government. We thought it would be particularly appropriate for this anniversary year so that the students could discover for themselves the rich history of the school. This class is responsible for directing student activities at the school and directed the preparations and scheduling for our first Saturday morning Homecoming Parade in many years.

A second gift to the school was made using a combination of Adopt A Classroom money and CAP funds. Room 208, which for many years was the small theater room opposite the balcony seats in the auditorium, has been used for several years now as a math classroom. The afternoon light made audio-visual aids almost unusable because the window coverings had virtually disintegrated. We purchased three sets of blinds, which control both light and afternoon heat in that room.

German and World History teacher ROLF RICHTER requested a 100ml Vivitar lens, a Test-Rite copy stand and copy lights for preparing slides from prints and photographs. The resulting slides can be used in all the foreign language classes. There is an increasing emphasis on audio-visual instruction as the school develops its digital high school equipment. Richter led a student group to Germany this past summer and toured the new seat of government in Berlin. The students, mostly Dons, toured northern Germany when not attending their partner-exchange high school in Stadthagen.

We also provided some support in the way of equipment for the Dons baseball program. Dons coach FRED WARRECKER has put many hours into maintaining EDDIE MATHEWS FIELD as a prime playing surface. This year's team will be defending its Channel League championship. Come out to a game to enjoy a spring day; hot dogs and soft drinks are available in the parent-built and operated refreshment/announcing booth.

## RECOGNITION FOR SBHS's 125th

SBHS Principal John Richards '57 received special commendations for our school on the occasion of its 125th anniversary. Rep. LOIS CAPPs sent a congratulatory letter to Richards noting the school's many contributions to the community through its various programs. Capps was once an instructor in the Childhood Education Center, and her children are SBHS graduates.

NAOMI SCHWARTZ, Chair of the SB Board of County Supervisors, read a special proclamation praising the school and declaring the week of October 30 to November 6 SBHS Week. The document was received by Richards and Alumni Association President MAUREEN (MACQUIDDY) MASSON '53 at a regular board meeting at the county administration center.

The very next day, the Santa Barbara City Council bestowed similar honors on SBHS at the council chambers. Mayor HARRIET MILLER read the council's proclamation and also declared SBHS week for our homecoming week.

In an impressive ceremony at the Santa Barbara Board of Education meeting in mid-October, a commendation of excellence was read and presented to Principal Richards and to MARION (HUAUN) ANDERSON '25, Vice-President of the ASB in 1924-25. Anderson accepted the document and a lovely bouquet of red roses and responded with a gracious acceptance speech. She stressed her pride in the school over all these years and cordially thanked the board and all the school boards who have so consistently worked over the years for the benefit of the students in the district.

Governor GRAY DAVIS, State Senator JACK O'CONNELL and Rep. HANNAH BETH JACKSON sent resolutions of congratulation and praise for SBHS's record of achievement over its 125 years.

California's Secretary for Education, GARY HART '61 sent a handsome plaque noting the rich tradition of the school and signed off with a hearty "Go Dons!" The entire Don community is honored by such recognition. We can only hope that this year's anniversary events and its concurrent examination of a rich past will inspire the school and the students to maintain such a rich heritage.

## MEMORIES FROM '29 THROUGH 31

On October 16, 1999, ADELINE LYNN (VERCELLINO) ANDERSON '31 hosted a cocktail party for several friends to talk about SBHS in those early years on the Anapamu St. campus. Her guests included MARGARET (BARNETT) SAVAGE '29, FRANCIS 'WES' SAVAGE '29, JOHN CAMPILIO '53 and ROSEANNE (CAMPILIO) BALDWIN '56.

Margaret was the editor of *The Forge*, and Wes was the sports editor and an outstanding trackman. He was among the eight-man one-mile relay runners who set a record for the event, which was last run in that year. Margaret's aunt was the school's secretary, and her mother had been the music director before transferring to Santa Barbara State Teachers College.

According to Margaret and Wes, the Class of 1929 was large enough to make graduation in the auditorium impossible. As a result, their class became the first to take the walk down into Peabody Stadium for their

commencement ceremony.

Adeline's class had been the first class to go through three years at La Cumbre. She knew Wes and Margaret at SBHS, but since they were mighty seniors, two years ahead of her, she didn't socialize with them. Class barriers were in vogue even then.

Dress style for the girls was usually a skirt and twin sweater set. Miss GOWER, Dean of Girls, frequently measured the length of the skirts to be sure they were appropriate. The boys had not yet shifted to Levis; they wore cords, the dirtier the better according to Wes. Early in his time at SBHS Wes decided to vary the routine by wearing knickers and was promptly "pantsed".

All three remembered MISS MOSS, MISS NOYES, MISS CARTER, and COACH SCHUTTE. In Miss Noyes' class Wes caused a brief sensation by his parody of Wordsworth's "Ode to Immortality." His work was entitled "Ode to Immorality". It was an enjoyable evening, one marked by special memories of our Alma Mater.



# IN MEMORIAM

DOROTHY (WESTFALL) BRUBECK (Assoc. ) Although not a graduate of SBHS, there is no one among our membership who was more loyal and dedicated to the school and this association. The Fall '98 Newsletter profiled her career at SBHS and her contributions to the association. Most teachers labor privately in their classrooms. Dorothy Brubeck inspired her students to public demonstrations of excellence, 35 or more times a year in FORGE issues and once more in a wider display in our OLIVE AND GOLD yearbooks. With constant affection and wit, often sorely tested, she encouraged thousands of students in publication works and in English classes. Some of us on the board were privileged to work with her as her students and later as fellow board members. In both cases for Dorothy Brubeck it was a labor of love. The Dorothy Brubeck Living Memorial Scholarship will be joined with the Henry Brubeck Memorial Scholarship in accordance with her wishes.

TERRY BOYES, our longtime band director, who was our informal grand marshal of the Homecoming Parade, has passed away. Boyes inspired many Don band members with his devotion to musicianship and marching and show discipline. Former band members are encouraged to make contributions to the current band program through the SBHS Band Boosters c/o Sharon Henning; 1740 Calle Poniente; S. B. 93101.

LISA (CAPPS) DROSTROM '82, who had focused her work on the study of autism. A noted teacher and researcher at UC Berkeley, she won an Alumni Scholarship in 1982.

RUTH (HINEMAN) EFAW '32, a 72-year resident of Santa Barbara, and a graduate of old Franklin School located on East Montecito St., now Guadalupe Hall on the church grounds there. A cheerleader at SBHS and a member of the '32 reunion committee, Ruth maintained her enthusiasm for the school and the community in an active life here in Santa Barbara.

JACK W. 'BUD' FRANKLIN '31. A U. S Navy veteran of World War II and an avid tennis player and teacher. A frequent attendee at class reunions, he never lost his love for SBHS and the community.

# Introducing Mr. John Whittemore '17

On October 21, Tony Huerta '00 and Danielle Thayer '03 videotaped an interview with JOHN WHITTEMORE '17 who is quite likely SBHS's oldest living graduate. Mr. Whittemore described his years at the old Anapamu/De La Vina site, which he reached via a five-mile horseback ride each day. "I had to get up early, feed and saddle the horse, then ride to school. Fortunately, there were only two paved roads in the whole area. I would tie the horse to an old pepper tree, and give him water in a bucket I carried from home."

Mr. Whittemore described a school of around 600 students, with fine teachers, no coaches, and a tennis court that included the wall of one of the buildings as a sideline for the court. "It made for an interesting game—a combination of tennis and squash."

Mr. Whittemore's love was athletics, especially track and baseball, teams which often received instruction from alumni and other townspeople. In his senior year the baseball team won the county championship, and he can recall the earliest days of track and field competition at Carpinteria's Russell Cup Meet. To this day he participates in the Masters Class Track Competition, mainly as a thrower of the shot, discus, javelin and hammer, since he wore out his left knee and had to forego his specialties in the running and jumping events. He has a wall full of athletic medals from his many years of competition.

Whittemore has fond memories of the SBHS faculty, expressing special admiration for Ms. Jane Carroll Byrd, head of the English Department and Vice Principal. "She was really the main force in that school." Her teaching prepared him so well that he easily passed an English placement exam at Stanford, thereby escaping Bonehead English. Like many young people, then and now, he began college with no clear idea of a major, and after running up against arduous math and science courses, he spent two semesters on probation. Knowing that a third would put him out, "I beat them to the punch and shifted my major." He graduated in 1922.

Among his fascinating anecdotes from his SBHS years, Whittemore recalled standing before the student body prepared to speak on behalf of his small section of the junior class. "My mind went blank and I stood there quietly. Sensing some trouble, a fellow student yelled out something about the few members of my class. I simply responded, 'Well, we emphasize quality, not quantity.' And then I sat down."

John Whittemore indeed represents quality. When he celebrated his 100th birthday in November, he insisted there be only one candle on the cake. As he put it, "It will mark my century." Mr. John Whittemore, you mark with great distinction a century for yourself and for SBHS.

# Veterans' Day Ceremony, Three Names Added To The Memorial

On Wednesday, November 10, approximately 150 students, alumni, and townspeople gathered in front of the gymnasium to honor alumni of SBHS who died in this country's wars. Three new names were added to the memorial plaque: PHILIP GARCIA '42; EARL A. McALLISTER '41; WALTER SECREST '31. A fourth name, WILLIAM R. SIMPSON '51 was added after the ceremony. Simpson, like one other veteran, was killed in a plane crash during the Cold War. We knew that additional names would be found among records and in the memories of other graduates and their families. Provision was made for these additions on the original plaque.

BILL STEWART, CDR, USN Ret., presided over the ceremony which began with the raising of the flag by the ROTC cadets and featured remarks by four faculty members, LOUIS TORRES, HERB SIMPKINS, FRED GUILLERMO, and DAVID SCOTT, all veterans of the armed forces. The ceremony concluded with the playing of taps by KEVIN COLE '00.

The faculty veterans struck the central theme of sacrifice and honor, as they spoke poignantly of the dedication and loyalty of their own fellow servicemen and women, and emphasized the particular sacrifices of the alumni named on our memorial. As with WALTER EHLERS' speech last year, they pointed out to the student audience that most of the names on the monument were names of young men who were not much older than the students themselves.

Early in October we had received a letter from WELLS A. McALLISTER '35, who inquired if his brother's name had been inscribed on the memorial. We replied that Earl's name had been added and would be read at this year's ceremony. All of the


names represent special memories for friends and family, and Wells informed us of the details surrounding his brother's death. Their father, JOHN W. McALLISTER, was director of instrumental music in the school district from 1930 to 1942. He was the band director at SBHS for many of those years. Wells' sister Lucile graduated from SBHS in 1940. These facts make clear the many lines of friendship and family ties which these 116 memorialized names represent. These deaths still reach out to affect hundreds of people.

An important part of this year's ceremony was the dedication of a plaque to hang alongside the WWII service banner which was recently restored under the direction of social studies teacher HERB SIMPKINS. The SBHS chapter of MECHA (Movimiento Estudiantil Chicanos de Atzlan), advised by KEN RIVAS, contributed the funds for the plaque. Present at the ceremony were SBHS students ALEX RAMOS, JESUS SOSA VERONICA GUERRERO, MARISOL MURRILLO, AND MARIBEL MESA. Ramos and Murrillo are co-presidents of the group which conducted several fund raisers to pay for the plaque. Thanks to MECHA.

This banner and plaque, now displayed in the main hallway by the faculty workroom, will bring home to our students the sacrifices and service of their predecessors during WWII. The Alumni Association wants to thank the participants who honored us with their memories and testaments this year. 
